Learning outcomes:

After completing the course, the student will be able to:

- Describe and explain the basic methodological and methodological approach to the study of dialect as a non-written language unit.
- Characterize the research methods of dialectal research based on the basic principles and concepts of the current linguistic methodology.
- Apply the theoretical knowledge gained during the writing of the narrative text (expert, reader and combined).
- Demonstrate the knowledge of phonetic transcription applied in terrain research.
- Control the basic division of Rusyn, Slovak and Polish dialect according to individual language characters.
- Apply the theoretical knowledge in interpreting Slovak, Rusyn and Polish dialects from the synchronic and diachronic aspect.
- Define spatial research of dialects and the basic concepts of site-based research: isoglossy, adventure and cartographic dialect.
- Demonstrate good orientation in the literature review of linguistic atlases in Slovak, Rusyn, Ukrainian, Polish and World Dialectology.
- Based on the acquired knowledge, know how to work with literature, search information in information databases, and apply the acquired knowledge to the analysis and characterization of dialects in the wider Slavonic context.
