Prerequisite courses: None	
Conditions for passing the course: The course is completed by the exam. Systematic preparation and active participation at the seminars is required, where the student works on assignments- elaboration of transcripts and reading of the selected texts at the seminar. The student hands in a seminar paper on the selected topic of the Latin palaeography, papyrology or filigranology. The final evaluation consists of assessment of text reading (10%), seminar paper (20%) and assessment of written examination (theoretical knowledge and practical skills of students (70%). The student is allowed to miss two seminars during the semester. For any further absence (justified by the serious reasons) at the seminar, the student must elaborate a special written task (for example transcription) upon the agreement with the lecturer.	
Learning outcomes: The student can: - characterize, in their own words, individual types of the Latin script, development stages, provenance, chanceries and typology of fonts - identify and describe, based on the written sources, the Latin script used in the documents and books - obtain practical skills, master reading of samples of period texts chosen by the lecturer - identify and break down the abbreviation system, provide examples from various historical periods - make a transcript of period documents - master the basics of valid editorial rules - have a discussion on relevant methodological issues, development and characteristics of the Latin script. Writing materials and tools used in Europe and world - present a seminar paper, - familiarize with professional literature, source base to the presented topic, discuss the topic and justify its elaboration in the submitted form	
Course content: History, methodology, terminology of Latin palaeography, get acquainted with the development of the auxiliary historical science. State of research and current trends and	

procedures. Tools and materials for writing. Genesis of writing and overview of world writing systems. History and development of Latin script from the Antiquity up to the present. Abbreviation system used in Latin language, numerals, punctuation. Papyrology, filigranology. Practical reading of texts. Get acquainted with rules of transcribing, editing of primary sources.

Prerequisites: -	
Conditions for passing the course: The course ends with an exam. Active preparation and study of professional literature is required to complete the course. The course is realized in the form of lectures and independent work of students with literature and basic sources - works of Greek and Roman historians (Herodotus, Thucydides, Xenophon; G. Iulius Caesar, G. Sallustius Crispus, Titus Livius, Tacitus, Suetonius). The final evaluation will be a note for oral exam.	
Learning outcomes: By completing the course, the students will gain knowledge about the development and transformations of the oldest ancient states in Europe, Africa and Asia. They will get acquainted with important sources of the time. They will gain knowledge about the birth and development of ancient civilizations in the Greeks, Etruscans and Romans. They will understand the place, role and importance of ancient culture for the birth of the Middle Ages.	
Course content: The influence of natural conditions on the formation of the oldest state units. History of research of ancient civilizations. Civilizations in Mesopotamia and Egypt - periodization of history, political and cultural history. Cyclades, Crete and the Aegean region in the third and second millennium BC. Culture and civilization of ancient China, Harrap civilization, ancient Iran, Phenicia and Judea in the first millennium BC, Early Greek polis, Greek colonization of the Mediterranean and Black Sea, Greek states in the fifth and fourth centuries BC.. Alexander the Great and the emergence of Hellenistic empires, Roman history - its periodization, political and cultural history.

Active preparation and study of specialist literature for every seminar is required in order to complete the course. During the semester, the student prepares, presents at the seminar, and submits a seminar paper according to a pre-selected topic. A colloquium will take place in the credit week, the task of which will be to check students' knowledge of individual topics of the course. The final continuous assessment is calculated as the average of the evaluation of the seminar paper and colloquium (40 + 60 points).
