The Constitutional Court of the Slovak Republic and courts in Slovakia (election, requirements for candidates, term of office, proceedings on compliance of legal regulations with the Slovak Constitution and constitutional laws, constitutional complaint, other powers of the constitutional court, structure of judicial bodies as components of the political system, system of courts, their creation, the position of the Supreme Court, the position of the prosecutor's office and its functions, the position and functions of the ombudsman in the legal system.
- 7. Referendum (constitutional arrangement: obligatory versus optional referendum).
- 8. Territorial administrative division of the Slovak Republic (decentralization of state power, delimitation of competencies to local and regional public administration bodies, creation of local self-government, its competences, elections, creation of higher territorial units, delimitation of competences and financial resources, original and transferred competencies, elections to self-governing bodies regions, their competences and responsibility for regional development.

Students will prepare selected terms and court cases during the semester. They will be the subject of two written tests. The oral exam completes the course.

The practical contribution of the course: Students will use the knowledge in their professional profile as potential employees of state administration and self-government bodies, journalists, analysts, or employees of the non-governmental sector.

Practical benefits of the course: Students will understand the individual changes in the content and forms of diplomacy through the study and analysis of historical circumstances and contexts and key persons in diplomacy. They will use the particular findings in practice as potential applicants at the Ministry of Foreign end European Affairs of the Slovak Republic, in other state administration bodies and international organizations or EU institutions.

Through the analysis and study of the historical picture of international relations, the course aims to provide fundamental changes and basic development tendencies in diplomacy in their historical context from the modern age to the present. Attention is focused on analysing individual international negotiations (as the goals of dispute resolution), including the conclusion of treaties and their implementation in history from World War I to the present.

The issue of international relations, which also includes the history of diplomacy, is elaborated on several levels:

- a) examination of diplomacy in the various periods of modern history, taking into account an analysis of historical developments (analysis of circumstances) and an analysis of diplomatic negotiations with their consequences (war/peace);
- b) an analysis of the specific political interests (including their causes) of each country in the international environment, including how they are enforced (treaties, pacts, agreements of varying levels, importance and quality for stakeholders);
