# Prerequisites:

#### Conditions for passing the course:

The course is evaluated by continuous assessment. During the semester, the student prepares and submits a seminar paper - a comprehensive language comparison of Slovak and Czech text. At the end of the semester the student takes a knowledge test including theoretical and practical tasks. The student must obtain at least 90 % for grade A (excellent), 80 % for grade B, 70 % for grade C, 60 % for grade D and at least 50 % for grade E. Student who obtains less than 50% will be graded FX. The final evaluation is calculated as the average of the evaluation of the seminar work and the knowledge test.

Number of credits and time frame for the conditions for passing the course:

- 4 credits = 120 hours
- course teaching: 13 weeks 1 lecture / 1 seminar = 19.5 hrs.
- individual work preparation for the seminar, elaboration of the seminar paper: 44 hrs.
- self-study of study literature and preparation for the final test: 56.5 hrs.

In case of cancelling on-campus teaching due to UVZ/RUVZ/University/Faculty regulations, teaching and examination will be conducted in the distance form as ordered.

### Learning outcomes:

Acquired knowledge: After completion of the course, a student can describe the similarities and differences of Slovak and Czech as Western Slavic languages, can reflect selected sociolinguistic and contrastive-linguistic problems of contacts between Slovak and Czech. Acquired skills: After completion of the course, a student can use the acquired language, communication and presentation skills in practice (attempt to translate Czech texts into Slovak), has a developed skill of working with information, can perceive and evaluate intercultural contexts in the Czech-Slovak context, can contribute to development of the fieldby acquiring new knowledge in solving these tasks

Acquired competencies: After completion of the course, a student is able to compare selected linguistic phenomena on the example of Slovak and Czech as typologically, geographically and culturally close languages and cross-sectional (transferable, key): has developed cultural awareness and expression (has mastered the history of Slovak and Czech language and culture), is ready to take responsibility for his/her activities and decisions, taking into account the wider social consequences, can apply social and civic competencies in practice (can perceive the historical specificities of the Slovak-Czech language and socio-cultural realities that play a role in language development).

#### Brief design of the course:

- Phonological similarities and differences between Slovak and Czech as Western Slavic languages.
- Orthoepic and orthographic differences between Slovak and Czech.
- Morphological differences between Slovak and Czech. Verbs. Overview of conjugation types. Grammatical categories. Nouns. Declension system. Adjectives. Pronouns and numerals. Inflexible parts of speech.
- Syntax. Addressing and polite addressing. Predicate. Verb patterns. Negation. Passive constructions. Word order. Functions of pronouns in sentence structure.
- An attempt to translate Czech texts into Slovak.
- Selected sociolinguistic and contrastive linguistic problems of Slovak and Czech contacts.

The paper will also be submitted in the written form of a professional paper (min. 5 pages). The student must obtain at least 90 % for grade A (excellent), 80 % for grade B, 70 % for grade C, 60 % for grade D and at least 50 % for grade E. Student who obtains less than 50% will be graded FX.

The final evaluation is calculated as the average of the grade of oral presentation and its written elaboration. The works are presented in the form of a colloquium.

The course is completed by final exam. During the semester, the student regularly attends lectures and actively cooperates in activities given during seminar meetings. During the semester, regular attendance in on-campus classes is required, including individual preparation. Maximum of 2 absences are allowed. Due to excessive absence, the student did not meet the basic condition for the grading of the discipline completed by the exam and will be evaluated by the FX grade - insufficient.

During the semester, each student prepares at least one professional paper on a predetermined topic. During the examination period, the student signs up for the date of the oral examination listed in MAIS and successfully performs it.

To obtain an A (excellent), the student must obtain at least 90 %, to obtain a B - 80 %, to obtain a C - at least 70 %, to obtain a D - 60 %, to obtain an E - at least 50 %. Student who obtains less than 50% will be graded FX. The final evaluation is calculated as the average of the evaluation of the prepared professional paper, oral exam and individual activity during seminar meetings. Number of credits and time frame for the conditions for passing the course:

#### Learning outcomes:

The student recognizes, understands and critically reflects on the ideas and starting points of various schools that participated in the formation of literary thinking in the 20<sup>th</sup> century, and based on the acquired knowledge re-evaluates their activity/justification in relation to research methods applied in literary theory, literary history and literary criticism.* **Acquired skills:** After completion of the course, a student *identifies, integrates and reevaluates the theoretical premises applied in the analysis of literary works, is able to critically* 

assess and supplement these premises, thereby modifying the nature and method of

argumentation in the discourse on literature. The student approaches questions about the nature of literariness in a creative way and contributes to the reflection of the structure and function of (a certain type of) literary discourse. The student approaches the discourse on literature analytically, examines and questions the procedures of literary theory, literary history and literary criticism.

Acquired competencies: After completion of the course, a student *is able to think at the level* of critical reflection on the conditions of literary theory, criticism and history, situate individual theoretical concepts in the system of literary science, describe individual literary methodologies, identify their basic concepts and clearly systematize them into a comprehensive thought structure, apply specific concepts of literary science in terms of literary history, theory, criticism and for the needs of interpretation of artistic text, define the scientific significance of the presented theoretical concepts, confront them with each other, determine their argumentative capacity and contribution in terms of scientific research of literary work.

### Brief design of the course:

Dialogue as a basic feature of novel stylistics. Style as an exploration system of a work of art. Dialogic orientation of the word and its essential artistic possibilities.

J. Derrida and the specific understanding of the sign through différance, difference and postponement of the process of establishing difference / meaning.

To the attempts of the formulation of the feminist literary theory. To the four models of differences between female and male writing - biological, linguistic, psychoanalytic, cultural.

To the nature and status of fictional details and fictional representations. Semantics of fiction, the concept of reference and self-referentiality. Frame of fictional worlds, fictional text.

To the context of poetics, phenomenology, hermeneutics and reception theories. Aesthetics of the Reception (H. R. Jauss) and the Theory of aesthetic response (W. Iser), text structure and incompleteness as a condition of the effect of literary text.

To obtain an A (excellent), the student must obtain at least 90%, to obtain a B – 80%, to obtain a C – 70%, to obtain a D – 60%, to obtain an E – at least 50%. A student who obtains less than 50% will be graded FX. The final evaluation is calculated as the average of the evaluation of active participation in seminars, seminar and final work.

## Conditions for passing the course:

Successful graduation of university studies is conditional on passing a state exam/s. This exam will complete a full-time study in master's degree programs. The schedule of exam implementation is determined by the internal regulations of the faculty. The student is obliged to register for the next date of the state exam after graduation. Failure to apply for this deadline is considered a failure to comply with the obligations of the study regulations, for which the student may be expelled from the study. The state examination will be performed before the examination commission for the state examination.

Each part of the state exam is evaluated separately. The individual parts of the state examination are evaluated by classification grades A to FX. The overall evaluation of the state exam is calculated from the average of the grades of the individual coursed of the state exam and the grades from the final thesis defense.

Presents their knowledge of the texts they have read. Creates own original text intended for a younger recipient (fairy tale, etc.) and presents it in a seminar class. During the examination period, the student takes a knowledge test and an oral examination. In order to obtain the A rating a student must achieve at least 92 % score, to obtain B 84%, C at least 76 %, D 65% and E at least 51 % scores. A student who achieves less than 51 % score will be evaluated with FX. The final grade is calculated from the average of the percentage marks of the test, the oral answer and the seminar paper.

Number of credits and time frame for completing the course requirements:

5 credits = 150 hours

During the semester, it conducts 2 intermediate knowledge tests. It must obtain at least 90 % for an A grade (excellent), 80 % for a B grade, 70 % for a C grade, 60 % for a D grade and 50 % for an E grade. A student who receives less than 50% will be graded with a grade of FX. The final grade is calculated as the average of the active work in seminars, the seminar paper grade and 2 midterm tests.

The subject is evaluated continuously: During the semester, the student prepares and submits a seminar paper - a contrastive analysis of the text and its translation. At the end of the semester, the student takes a knowledge test. The student must obtain at least 90 % for a grade A (excellent), 80 % for a grade B, 70 % for a grade C, 60 % for a grade D and at least 50 % for a grade E. A student who obtains less than 50% will be graded FX. The final evaluation is calculated as the average of the seminar work's evaluation and the knowledge test.

Number of credits and time frame for the conditions for passing the course:

- 2 credits = 60 hours.
- course teaching: 13 weeks 1 lecture / 1 seminar = 19.5 hours.
- individual work preparation for the seminar, elaboration of the seminar work: 20.5 hours.

# Learning outcomes:

**Acquired competencies**: After completion of the course, a student can use the acquired language, communication and presentation skills in practice (can compare individual language phenomena based on data from parallel corpora), has a developed skill of working with information when working with corpus tools, can perceive and evaluate intercultural contexts, can contribute to the development of the section by acquiring new knowledge in solving these tasks.

**Acquired competencies:** After completion of the course, a student perceives and is able to interpret and describe the differences between Slovak and typologically, geographically and culturally related languages, cross-sectional (transferable, key): the graduate has a developed cultural awareness and expression, can apply social and civic competencies in practice (can perceive the historical specifics of the relationship between Slovak and other languages, including socio-cultural facts that play a role in language development).

- Cultural allusions in language. Idioms in Slavic and non-Slavic languages.
- Interlingual transfer. Positive and negative transfer. Interference. Adaptation processes.
- Contrastive linguistics and parallel corpora.
