The course is completed by a colloquial examination, after submission and positive evaluation of the semester work. The thesis is in the form of an essay and consists of two parts: the first part is a reflection on the knowledge of history in the works of philosophers and historians from the earliest times to the present; the second part is a reflection on the knowledge of those historians that are the subject of the dissertation, while higlighting and refelcting upon the limits in the work of the given historian(s) (still using the example of the dissertation), the meaning and significance of historical criticism, etc., That is to say; the task of the historian to know and understand "his" section of history and to interpret it in such a way that "my" image of the past is identical with the past itself, but also that "my" image of the past is reflected in the mind of the reader, the listener, in the same form as it is in the mind of the historian. Thus, care must be taken to avoid unnecessary shifts, and thus a false image, in the interpretation of the period under study.

Number of credits and time limits for fulfilling the course requirements. These are awarded as follows: 3 credits for the term paper, 2 credits for the answer at the colloquial examination.

Both parts are graded with points: term paper 0 to 6 points; answer 0 to 4 points. In order to pass the course, the student needs to earn a total of at least 7 credits.

Learning outcomes:

The student will gain a basic overview of the views on history as an objective process and on history as a science. The student will acquire knowledge of the basic sources of historical sources and will be able to identify and research them as necessary, master the methods of historical research and work with professional literature.

Acquired knowledge: the student will gain a basic overview of the characteristics of historical periods, the philosophy of history and information about the functioning and importance of the sources with which the historian works.

Skills acquired.

Acquired competences: the student is able to analyse information, to put it into a broader context, to reconstruct an objective picture of the past.
