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The content of the field of the habilitation and the inauguration proceedings

Name of the field of habilitation and inauguration proceeding: Slavic Languages and Literature

Slavic Languages and Literature is a field of study from the system of study fields processed by the Ministry of Education of the Slovak Republic, as an area of knowledge (§ 50 ods. 1 Zákona č. 131/2002 Z.z.), after which the successful graduate of the study field (§ 51 ods. 1 Zákona 131/2002 Z.z.) acquires professional competence/competence to pursue their initial profession or prepares to pursue follow-up higher education studies.

The programme prepares multidisciplinary oriented experts focused on a specific language area. It consists of thorough philological preparation and study of the sociocultural context of the area. It represents the integration of philology, humanities, and social sciences. Thus, language or philological preparation in a broader context emerges from its systemic closure. Its mission is to educate experts with a sufficiently wide overview in a particular language area.

Definition of the field of the habilitation and inauguration procedure

Slavic Languages and Literature relate to the topics of the field of study of philology, which includes knowledge, skills, and competences related to

- (a) the construction, structure, and historical development of natural languages, the social status and functioning of languages in people-to-people communication and in broader social, cultural, and pragmatic contexts;
- (b) diachronic and synchronic relations and links between languages and language groups;
- (c) language learning and the development of communication-pragmatic competences and skills linked to oral and written speech and to graduates working in the public sphere;
- (d) learning the history of literature and knowledge from literature theory and literary science methodology;
- (e) cultivating interpretive skills in working with literary texts and written records from a variety of communication spheres;
- (f) analysis, interpretation, and publication of texts of literary and cultural works.

Philology also involves knowledge related to the theory of literature and the history of national literature, Slovak language and literature, non-Slavic languages and literatures, Oriental languages and cultures, classical languages, foreign languages, general linguistics, linguistics, linguistics of specific language groups, translation and interpretation, literary science, didactics of language and literature.
