




Department of Chemistry and Industrial Chemistry

The Department of Chemistry and Industrial Chemistry (DCIC) was set up in 1996, as a result of merging the four former departments of General Chemistry, Industrial Chemistry, Physical Chemistry and Organic Chemistry within the Faculty of Mathematics, Physics and Natural Sciences.

The department is housed in one building in Via Dodecaneso, adjacent to the Departments of Physics, Mathematics and Information Technology, and occupy the small valley of the Valle Puggia area. DCIC offers a three-year BSc degree course in Chemistry and Chemical Technologies and MSc degree courses in Chemical Sciences, Industrial Chemistry and Materials Science and Engineering; It is the associate department for the three-year MSc degree course in Materials Science.




