Conditions for passing the course: <i>The course is completed by an exam. To pass the exam, the student must defend the semester's work – his own essay – the biography of his ancestor, thus demonstrating the ability to work with archival material, registers, material sources, interview method and oral history.</i>	
Number of credits and time span for the conditions of completing the course: <i>After completing the course, the student receives 2 credits, 1 credit for the pedigree and 1 credit for the essay (biography of his ancestor). The pedigree and essay are processed during the winter semester and presented at the exam.</i>

<p>Results of education: <i>Students will gain knowledge from the prehistory of Europe as the longest section of human history, which will also acquaint them with the oldest history of Slovakia and its region.</i></p> <p>Learning outcomes: <i>Gets a basic overview of the characteristics of the historical periods, of the European prehistoric period and information on the functioning and significance of the sources with which the historian works.</i></p> <p>Learned skills: <i>Students are able to orient themselves in professional literature, read professional texts with understanding and critical insight.</i></p> <p>Learned competences: <i>The student can analyze information, put it in a broader context, reconstruct an objective picture of the past.</i></p>	
<p>Course content: <i>The subject European prehistory is interpreted by the prehistoric human society on the basis of archaeological sources. For the purposes of applying a comprehensive approach to development-relationship contacts, it is also necessary to follow prehistoric developments outside Europe in the basic lines. This overview is preceded by an introduction to the study of prehistoric history, the basics of archaeological methodology and a brief history of archaeological science.</i></p>

<p>Conditions for passing the course: <i>The course is completed by a final exam. In order to complete the course, active preparation and study of professional literature is required. The course is realized in the form of lectures and independent work of students with literature and basic sources - works of Greek and Roman historians (Herodotus, Thukydides, Xenofon; G. Iulius Caesar, G. Sallustius Crispus, Titus Livius, Tacitus, Suetonius). The final assessment will consist of a mark for the oral exam. The course is realized in the form of lectures and independent work of students with literature and basic sources - works of Greek and Roman historians (Herodotus, Thukydides, Xenofon; G. Iulius Caesar, G. Sallustius Crispus, Titus Livius, Tacitus, Suetonius). During the semester, the student will elaborate and submit a seminar paper. It shall conduct an oral examination during the examination period. To obtain an A (excellent), the student must obtain at least 92 %, to obtain a B - 84 %, to obtain a C - at least 76 %, to obtain a D - 65 %, to obtain an E - at least 51 %. The student who receives less than 51 % will be graded FX. The final grade is calculated as the average of the seminar paper grade and the oral answer.</i></p>	
<p>Study results: <i>By completing the course, the student will gain knowledge about the development and transformation of the oldest ancient states in Europe, Africa and Asia. He gets acquainted with significant period springs. It will gain knowledge about the birth and development of ancient civilizations in Greeks, Etruscans and Romans. He will understand the place and role and importance of ancient culture for the birth of the Middle Ages.</i></p>	
<p>Course content: <i>The influence of natural conditions on the creation of the oldest state formations. The history of the research of ancient civilizations. Civilizations in Mesopotamia and Egypt – periodization of history, political and cultural history. Cyclades, Crete and the Aegean region in the third and second millennium BC. Culture and civilization of ancient China, Harrap civilization, ancient Iran, Phoenicia and Judea in the first millennium BCE, Early Greek Polis, Greek colonization of the Mediterranean and the Black Sea, Greek states in the fifth and fourth centuries BCE. Alexander of Macedonia and the emergence of Hellenistic empires, Roman history – their periodization, political and cultural history.</i></p>

During the 3-4-day excursion (realized not continuously for 3-4 days in a row), students will visit the glacial alpine landscape, the karst landscape, the landscape of volcanic structures, the lowland and basin type of the landscape, various cultural types of the landscape, etc. Subsequently, they process local notes based on the visited sites and the interpretation of the excursion leader.
