In the Anthropology programme, the level of qualification that students gain on successful completion is clearly specified and communicated, with the qualification corresponding to the appropriate level of education according to the Qualifications Framework. The objectives and measurable learning outcomes correspond to the level of the Slovak Qualifications Framework in the European Higher Education Area: third level - PhD, level SKKR 8

Proof of qualification is a university diploma, a certificate of state examination and a supplement to the diploma.

Profile of the graduate and the objectives of education in the sense of the Description of the study field Biology - 3rd degree of higher education

The graduate is able to evaluate and appropriately choose methods of basic and applied research in the field of biology. He/she has extensive professional knowledge in several areas of the field of study, which he/she uses as a basis for conducting research and development in the relevant field. It focuses on acquiring the latest theoretical knowledge based on the current state of scientific knowledge in particular areas of biology. It investigates biological systems and biochemical processes using the most progressive methodological approaches. The results of creative experimental work not only contribute to the development of science and scientific knowledge, but their appropriate scientific value enables their application in agriculture, forestry, medicine, pharmacology and the protection of the gene pools of plants, animals and man himself.

The graduate is able to formulate new hypotheses and strategies for further research and development of the study field of Biology. Apply the findings of his/her comprehensive scientific research in theoretical, systems and synthetic biology. On the basis of his/her outputs and findings, he/she is able to design, validate and implement new research and working procedures. He/she has a practical knowledge of experimental methods in biology, statistical and informatics methods and can use other knowledge from related scientific disciplines.

The graduate is characterised by independent, critical and analytical thinking. They take into account social, scientific and ethical aspects in formulating research objectives and interpreting research results. Independently presents research and development results to the professional community. Can determine the focus of research and coordinate a team in the relevant scientific field.

Educational objectives of the Anthropology (PhD.) study programme

The aim of doctoral studies in the study programme Anthropology is to provide students with a systematic, coherent and comprehensive body of knowledge in the field of anthropological disciplines, including knowledge and understanding of relationships to other parts of the field and to related disciplines, and to prepare students for independent scientific research work at a level corresponding to the current requirements of science. The study programme prepares experts-specialists in the field who possess knowledge, abilities and skills corresponding to international criteria.

In its new conception, the discipline to which the Anthropology programme belongs integrates biological anthropology, including genetics, ecology and human ethology, with socio-cultural anthropology in a holistic approach to the study of human beings and populations. The aim of teaching at a general level is to master the theoretical foundations of the discipline and to actively master its methods and methodology of scientific research work, including their application, critical analysis, re-evaluation, innovation and the solution of complex problems. The basic methods taught in physical anthropology include somatometry, osteometry, anthropological somatoscopy, dermatoglyphics and other morphometric and morphological approaches, including newly introduced 3D non-contact techniques. Molecular genetics methods include PCR analysis, DNA sequencing and restriction analysis methods. The research activities of the training centre are focused on monitoring postnatal growth and development of children in normality and pathology, research on nutrition and obesity, study of morphological variability of populations, influence of external environmental factors on ontogenetic development of humans, monitoring of normal and abnormal craniofacial growth in the context of congenital developmental defects, evaluation of dermatoglyphic characteristics, especially in relation to developmental disorders, and analysis of human behavioural patterns. Training in

skeletal anthropology is provided primarily in the fields of palaeopathology and forensic anthropology. Molecular genetic studies include, in addition to forensic applications, the analysis of receptor genes and genetic polymorphisms in variable regions of human chromosomes and in the genetics of the musculoskeletal system. They are also aimed at investigating the molecular basis of certain pathological conditions. The realization of the educational objectives is guaranteed by the experimental facilities of the Department of Biology and the Centre of Excellence of Animal and Human Ecology of the University of Life Sciences in Prešov, especially in the fields of molecular biology, biochemistry and human genetics. At the same time, studying in the doctoral programme in Anthropology allows interdisciplinary penetration with medical disciplines such as epidemiology, endocrinology, paediatrics, cardiology and other medical disciplines. The study of Anthropology and its knowledge is also relevant to the socio-cultural and economic development of populations and to the management of ethnic and social contradictions. It aims at understanding cultural distinctiveness and uniqueness in the context of intercultural contacts and linkages. It seeks to understand current social processes in the context of their genesis, in their historical and cultural contexts and in the context of today's globalising tendencies.

Last but not least, one of the key objectives of the present study programme is to develop and promote the student's individuality, independence, responsibility, critical thinking, leadership, abilities to conceive, formulate, construct, and implement his/her own hypotheses, strategies, and research activities while synthesizing new and complex concepts, adhering to scientific and ethical principles, and then communicating and interpreting his/her findings to professional scientific communities as well as to the general public, thus promoting technological, social, and cultural progress. Specific profile of the graduate of the study programme Anthropology (PhD.)

The educational objectives of the Anthropology study programme shape the specific profile of the graduate. The graduate of the study programme Anthropology (3rd level of university studies) will master the principles of scientific work, formulation of a scientific problem (scientific assignment), legal, ethical and social aspects of their own scientific work, presentation and practical application of their own results, development of the scientific and study field of Anthropology in the national and global context.

The graduate is proficient in the scientific methods of research in anthropology with a focus on one of its subdisciplines and is able to apply them in his/her activities: to propose and formulate scientific hypotheses, concepts and projects, to organize and lead a solution-oriented team, to formulate application and innovative projects in the field of anthropology and to solve them in accordance with the needs of practice. Proficient in scientific research methods and creatively implement them in various fields of anthropology. In practice, graduates are qualified for the fields of clinical, functional, ergonomic, forensic, developmental anthropology and molecular and forensic genetics. It aims at acquiring the latest theoretical and practical knowledge in accordance with the current state of scientific knowledge in anthropology as a field that focuses on the observation of genetic variability and processes of change of the human organism throughout ontogenetic and phylogenetic development, on macro and micro chemistry as well as on the dynamism of the organism, on the relationships between the structure and function of organs, on human nutrition and on the control systems of the organism.

By graduating from the Anthropology study programme, the student has the above knowledge, skills and competences.

Knowledge:

- possess a coherent, systematic and comprehensive body of professional knowledge in cultural, social, clinical, sport, forensic, physical, ethnic anthropology, paleoanthropology, auxology and other specialized areas,
- can define and describe the basic contexts of anthropology and anthropological research in an interdisciplinary context,
- has a deep knowledge of theories of human development, genetic patterns, inter-population differences, behavioural patterns, abnormalities of individual development, sophisticated methods and procedures of science and research corresponding to international criteria,
- has information on the current state of scientific knowledge and takes it into account when formulating research objectives and interpreting research results,
- has knowledge of current social processes in the context of their genesis, in their historical and cultural context and in the context of today's globalisation tendencies.

Skills:

- can explore sources of professional information dealing with human research issues from different perspectives and acquire new knowledge in an active way,
 - be able to use the knowledge acquired as a basis for carrying out research and development in the relevant field of anthropology and related sciences,
- actively implements information on the current state of scientific knowledge in his/her scientific research activities, proposes, verifies and implements new research and working procedures, improves and develops theories of variability and processes of change of the human organism throughout ontogenetic and phylogenetic development,
- is able to implement interdisciplinary overlaps, new approaches, methodologies and technologies in the study of human beings in the context of adherence to scientific and ethical principles,
- has manual skills in the use of instrumentation in anthropological research and specialisation fields (e.g. molecular biology, genetics, biometrics, ergonomics),
- can formulate new hypotheses and strategies for further research and development in the field of anthropology, and critically analyse and evaluate information.

Competencies:

- demonstrates the ability to conceive, design, implement and adapt a larger anthropological research process with academic integrity,
- can contribute to the advancement of knowledge in a specific area of anthropology at an international level and assess the impact of knowledge in terms of addressing social, ethical and global issues,
- can initiate solutions to socio-cultural and economic development and complex problems, including the formulation of solutions to manage ethnic and social contradictions with a view to understanding the cultural distinctiveness and uniqueness of individuals and populations,
- be able to assess and modify their own professional activities, communicate and defend their results in professional scientific communities at national and international level, as well as with the general public,
- can manage and coordinate anthropological and interdisciplinary research tasks and lead specialised teams,
- can promote technical, social and cultural progress.

- b) The institution indicates the professions for which the graduate is prepared at the time of completion and the potential of the study programme from the point of view of graduate's employability.

Anthropology is the only scientific discipline that deals with the study of man in a natural scientific context. Given the uniqueness of humans as both a biological species and a social creature, a comprehensive approach to the study of human-environment relations is essential. The content of anthropology understood in this way is consistent with the definition of anthropology in European universities and points to the importance of educating new generations of anthropologists who will find employment in a wide range of sectors of the labour market. Graduates of the Anthropology doctoral programme are specialists who can apply their qualifications in anthropologically oriented academic institutions and research institutes, as professionals, research team leaders, university teachers, university assistants, etc. The job description consists of the performance of professional, scientific, pedagogical, creative activities and consultancy. They are entitled to carry out independent scientific and research activities in the field of basic and applied research with a focus on anthropology, human biology and forensic sciences. Graduates of doctoral studies can be employed as specialists in skeletal remains at archaeological sites, in forensic and criminalistics workplaces, in medical institutions, in diagnostic laboratories, in sports sciences, in museums as specialists in anthropological collections. As specialists in biology, they can also find employment in the state administration and in state institutions in the departments of culture, sports. They can act as forensic experts and cooperate in investigations with law enforcement authorities, as well as in ergonomic institutions using knowledge of the relationship between man and the working environment (industrial design, occupational medicine, architecture and technology). With his aptitude and skills to develop applied research, prepare national and international projects and lead a research team, he is also ready to take on the position of a manager of a research institution.

c) Evaluation of the study programme quality by employers (feedback).

The basic units of the study programme Anthropology 3rd degree in the full-time form of study are: lecture, seminar, exercise, dissertation examination and dissertation defence. These units correspond to the structure of the study programme for the credit system of university studies. The profile subjects of the study programme are compulsory or compulsory elective subjects set so that the student, after their completion, acquires knowledge, skills or competences that are essential for successful completion of the study programme and future employment in practice. Profile subjects represent the theoretical and methodological basis in the relevant field of education. Together with other educational activities offered to the student in the form of elective courses, they will enable the student to access the knowledge, skills and competences relevant for the achievement of the learning outcomes listed in the graduate's profile and for his/her professional curriculum vitae.

In particular, the study programme in Anthropology takes into account the requirement to pass a dissertation examination and to prepare and submit a dissertation for defence at the end of the studies. Therefore, among the compulsory subjects there are the subjects "Thesis, research project for the dissertation examination", "Doctoral student's own scientific activity" in the full-time form of study. The compulsory elective subjects allow the student the opportunity to make an individual plan, which is a reflection of the personal prerequisites, interests and preferences of the doctoral student in what way and to what extent he/she will participate in research and project activities and publishing or other scientific or pedagogical activities.

b) *The institution compiles the recommended study plans for individual study paths¹⁰.*

Pursuant to par. 3 of Decree No. 614/2002 Coll. on the credit system of study, the courses included in the study programme Anthropology (PhD., 3rd degree of higher education, full-time form) are divided into:

- a) compulsory - their successful completion is a condition for successful completion of part or the entire study programme,
- b) compulsory electives - the condition for successful completion of a part of the study or the entire study programme is the successful completion of a specified number of these subjects according to the student's choice in the structure determined by the study programme,
- c) elective - other subjects which the student has the possibility to enrol in order to supplement his/her studies and to obtain a sufficient number of credits in the relevant part of the study (Section 51(4)(i) of the Act).

Courses included in the study programme are subdivided according to their continuity into:

- a) subjects conditional on successful completion of other subjects; enrolment in such a subject is conditional on successful completion of another subject (a prerequisite subject) or other subjects,
- b) courses without a continuation; enrolment in such a course is not conditional on the completion of another course.

The state examination (Section 63(1) of the Act on Higher Education and on Amendments to Certain Acts) shall be regarded as a subject.

In accordance with the legislation in force, a recommended study plan for the study programme Anthropology (PhD., 3rd cycle of higher education, full-time form) has been prepared, which is described in the following point 4. c). In accordance with the Study Regulations (PU Study Regulations: <https://www.unipo.sk/public/media/0190/STUD%2024.9.18%20pdf.pdf>), the study programme follows the rules of the European system of transfer and accumulation of credits and student workload per academic year. It complies with the specified workload in terms of the number of hours, together with other activities necessary for the preparation and completion of the course. Doctoral studies are carried out taking into account the uniqueness of the doctoral student according to an individual study plan. It is developed by the supervisor in collaboration with the doctoral student on the basis of the recommended study plan at the beginning of the academic year and subsequently submitted to the departmental committee for approval. The doctoral student's individual study plan consists of a study part and a scientific part.

- The study part of the doctoral studies consists mainly of lectures, seminars, exercises, individual consultations, independent work of the doctoral student and individual study of literature focused on the content of the doctoral thesis. Lectures and seminars end with a mid-term evaluation or an examination. The study part ends with the dissertation examination, which includes the defence of the written dissertation.
- The doctoral student's teaching activities shall be related to teaching activities of no more than four hours per week on average per academic year in which the teaching takes place. The full-time doctoral student's duties shall include supervising and opposing bachelor's theses to a maximum of ten theses on average during an academic year.
- The scientific part of the doctoral studies consists mainly of the active participation of the doctoral student in scientific seminars, scientific conferences and other professional events organised in science with issues related to the topic of the doctoral thesis. The scientific part ends with the defence of the dissertation, which verifies the student's ability to creatively apply the knowledge, skills and abilities acquired during the studies. It is focused on one of the areas of anthropology, taking into account interdisciplinary overlaps.

Teachers choose from a wide range of teaching forms and methods according to the nature and character of the subject and taking into account the needs of the students. Student-centred learning, independent creative work by students and the adoption of the active role of the student in the learning process have long been preferred. Teaching is based on linking theoretical and practical skills with an emphasis on developing the individuality of the student. The combination of knowledge-based tasks and practical assignments and projects enable students to improve their proficiency and develop practical skills and competencies. Teachers in each subject will use a range of teaching methods and forms - in addition to classical methods (such as lecturing, storytelling, etc.), the emphasis will be on the use of activating teaching methods (e.g. dialogical methods, situational methods, group teaching and cooperative learning methods, project methods, simulation methods, critical thinking methods, problem-based methods, etc.), which will be used to develop students' skills.) in order to arouse or strengthen students' interest in the topics covered, to increase students' activity, to enable students to apply and develop their professional knowledge, skills, competences for practice and key competences (e.g. creativity, autonomy, responsibility, flexibility, critical thinking). Doctoral students will be included in lesson planning and encouraged to engage in team building, peer teaching and creativity. The following activities support the achievement of the learning objectives: lectures, seminars, presentations, case studies, discussions, group work, project work, tutorials and supervision.

Doctoral students in the Anthropology programme have the opportunity to actively participate in professional events and conferences organised by the parent institution or other institutions at national or supranational level. Active involvement in the creative activities of the university is also related to the creation of their own publications and the opportunity to apply for a PU grant for PhD students or other research grants. Doctoral students are actively involved in the scientific research activities of the department staff and participate in the obtained grants, which creates the potential to acquire a lot of new knowledge and skills applicable in the future profession. Stimulation of students to these activities is already embedded in the design of the study programme itself, in the recommended study plan and in the information sheets of individual courses of doctoral studies. This methodological baseline based on stimulating doctoral students to take an active approach to learning will also be established in the approach to dissertations. Students are involved in the creative activities of the university appropriately in relation to the learning outcomes and the level of the qualification framework of the Anthropology study programme, which ultimately leads to the growth of the students' professional level and thus to the improvement of the scientific and professional potential of the faculty.

Subjects and educational activities of the Anthropology study programme are implemented in classrooms, laboratories and specialized and professional classrooms of the Department of Biology FHNS PU in Prešov, the Department of Ecology FHNS PU in Prešov and the Centre of Excellence for Animal and Human Ecology FHNS PU in Prešov in the location of the faculty's seat.

For successful completion of studies in the credit system of study, it is necessary that the student completes all compulsory courses and the prescribed number of compulsory elective courses, obtains the prescribed number of credits during the study, successfully passes the dissertation examination, and develops and defends the final dissertation thesis. Credits are also awarded for independent creative activity in the field of science (publications, completion of a defined stage in one's own research work, etc.)

According to the Study Regulations of the PU in Prešov from 2018, in order to advance to the second year of study, a full-time doctoral student must have obtained at least 40 credits, in order to advance to the third year of study, a full-time doctoral student must have obtained at least 80 credits, and in order to advance to the fourth year of study, a full-time doctoral student must have obtained at least 120 credits. For successful progression to the final year within the standard length of study, the doctoral student must successfully pass the dissertation examination. The number of credits to be achieved as a condition for the proper completion of studies for a third-level study programme with a standard length of study shall be at least 240 credits. The thesis and its defence shall be included in the total credits obtained and their assessment in the weighted average. The duration of the studies as laid down in the study regulations may not exceed the standard duration by more than four years.

g) Conditions for recognition of studies or a part of studies.

Study programmes are designed in accordance with ECTS transfer and credit recognition, with the priority that graduates of the SP acquire knowledge and new skills also through mobility at domestic and foreign institutions. Mobility is carried out within a wide range of publicly available schemes (ERASMUS+, SAIA, etc.).

Recognition of the completion of a course is the award of a course grade and the subsequent acquisition of the appropriate number of credits, which are assigned to the course, based on the part of the study undertaken in the past. A student who has previously studied at the university and his/her studies have not been properly completed, a student applying for transfer and a student applying for a change of study programme may apply for recognition of course completion if he/she fulfils the conditions set out in the Study Regulations of the University of Applied Sciences in Prešov. The student must apply in writing for the recognition of the completion of the courses before the beginning of the teaching part of the relevant semester of the academic year in which the course is taught. Recognition of the completion of courses is decided by the dean after the statement of the responsible teachers of the courses for which the student requests recognition. Transfer of credits is the process of counting credits obtained in the framework of a part of studies at another higher education institution in the Slovak Republic or at a higher education institution abroad towards the number of credits to be counted by the student according to § 4 (3) of the Decree on the credit system of studies. Academic mobility is formally conditioned by a study agreement between the student, the University of Prešov and the receiving university. The study contract contains in particular the proposed study plan at the receiving university and the recognition of the corresponding part of the studies at the sending faculty. The courses to be taken by the student at the receiving university on the basis of the study agreement become a valid part of the student's study plan. Courses taken at the receiving higher education institution in the context of academic mobility shall be recognised by the faculty on the basis of a transcript of studies drawn up by the receiving higher education institution at the end of the student's studies. The transcript of studies shall become part of the student's personal study record maintained by the faculty. The PhD student presents the results of the research in the form of an independent authorial text - a scientific thesis, which builds on the current state of research in the field. On the basis of the overview and understanding of the state of research, the doctoral candidate first sets the goals he or she wants to achieve and the methods to achieve them. In solving specific tasks, the doctoral student demonstrates the ability to think and work independently and critically, to systematically acquire new knowledge, expand the boundaries of knowledge, conceptualise it and implement it in his/her research topic. The length of the dissertation is set at 80 to 120 standard pages (144 000 to 216 000 characters, including spaces) according to the Guidelines on the requirements for theses, their bibliographic registration, originality checking, storage and accessibility.

The specific procedures for the definition of doctoral theses, their processing, defence and evaluation are set out in the PU Study Regulations in Articles 34 to 38.

8. Spatial, material, and technical provision of the study programme and support

a) List and characteristics of the study programme classrooms and their technical equipment with the assignment to learning outcomes and courses (laboratories, design and art studios, studios, workshops, interpreting booths, clinics, priest seminaries, science and technology parks, technology incubators, school enterprises, practice centers, training schools, classroom-training facilities, sports halls, swimming pools, sports grounds).

Spatial provision of the study programme

The University of Prešov in Prešov provides the activities of the individual units of the University in its own premises or in rented premises. The Faculty of Humanities and Natural Sciences, together with the Faculty of Arts, is situated in the largest building in the University Campus on 17. Novembra Street 1, Prešov. The whole complex of buildings consists of five interconnected parts in which the teaching and facilities of the faculties, lecture halls, lecture rooms and professional workplaces take place. The building provides all the activities necessary to ensure quality teaching of individual programmes. The total usable area of the building is 25060 m². It is a building constructed in the 80s of the last centuries, the premises are continuously repaired for the needs of the study fields and faculties. The building houses laboratories and centres of excellence for science and research, the university library and the first contact centre.

Material and technical support of the study programme

Since 2008, the University of Prešov in Prešov has undergone extensive modernization of classrooms. New equipment has been installed in a total of 165 seminar, lecture, and professional classrooms. These included 136 computers for lecture and seminar rooms, 406 computers for computer and professional classrooms, 132 data projectors and electric screens, 17 interactive whiteboards and other small equipment. In 2020, 25 of the largest classrooms at the university were further upgraded, ICT equipment and video-presentation technology were upgraded. Since 2008, modern metallic and fibre-optic computer wiring in 14 buildings of the university, including the initial wiring in the rooms of the students accommodated in the PU NDJ, has been built and expanded within the framework of the SF projects. A total of 1 694 computer sockets were installed. All buildings have high-speed networks, which typically operate at 1 Gbit/s, but are also ready for the introduction of 10 Gbit/s in the future. Between 2017 and 2020, the University underwent a complete replacement and refurbishment of the centrally managed Wi-Fi network at a cost of €154,000, with a total of 298 new access points installed in all buildings.

The scientific-pedagogical workplace of the Department of Biology has extensive and technical equipment for the education of students, which currently serves primarily for teaching and scientific research activities within the study programme Anthropology. Experimental facilities and premises of the Centre of Excellence in Animal and Human Ecology of PU are also available. The following facilities are available:

The room has computer ICT equipment, microscopy equipment (8 microscopes for practical training), data projector and projection screen, which are used in the educational process. From the software point of view, the classroom meets the requirements for teaching, the PC is installed with the Windows XP network operating system managed by the server, the computers are connected to the Internet.
3. Lecture and seminar rooms of the Faculty of Humanities and Natural Sciences of PU (97, 100, 238, 239) - teaching of lectures and seminars of compulsory and compulsory elective subjects of the study programme. The rooms are equipped with computer ICT equipment, data projector, which are used in the educational process. From the software point of view, the rooms meet the requirements set for teaching, the network operating system Windows XP managed by the server is installed on the PC, the computers are connected to the Internet.
4. The material, spatial and IT provision of the Anthropology study programme belonging to the scientific-pedagogical workplace - the Department of Biology of the Faculty of Philosophy and Humanities of the University of Prešov, has been built up for a long time and purposefully and currently serves for teaching and scientific-research activities. - b) Characteristics of the study programme information management (access to study literature according to Course information sheets, access to information databases and other information sources, information technologies, etc.).

All workplaces and all classrooms of FHNS are connected to the university network. The faculty has a newly built computer network based on manageable switches with a speed of 1Gbit/s, the new structured UTP cabling allows the transition to speed up to 10 Gbit/s. All classrooms are equipped with a data projector, an electric screen and a computer connected to the computer network, classroom computers are centrally managed, the computing centre is equipped with new powerful servers. This creates the technical conditions for the use of modern information technologies by the staff and students of FHNS. Students must log in to the faculty network, each student has his/her own password and access rights. FHNS has 4 faculty computer rooms, one of which is used for free student access, and 6 departmental classrooms and laboratories equipped with computer technology. The university-wide information systems include the Modular Academic Information System (MAIS), which is used for the administration of studies. All the necessary information is available to students on the faculty or departmental website. Lecturers also provide students with teaching materials in digitised form, communicate and consult with students also through electronic communication or via the website.

Teaching at FHNS PU in Prešov is carried out in well-equipped classrooms and laboratories for teaching and professional activities of students and PhD students. The faculty has 32 classrooms equipped with a computer connected to the network, a data projector, and an electric screen, 4 classrooms with an interactive whiteboard and one room with a sound system. All workplaces and all classrooms are connected to the university network, special software is available (statistical software, e-learning systems, internet media, resources to enable the disabled to participate in the regular teaching process). In the framework of educational activities, several specialised devices such as microscopes, stereomicroscopes, optical instruments, analysers, sampling devices, GNSS devices, UAV devices, etc. are used, cooperating (control, communication, and data transmission) with computer technology.

The scientific and pedagogical workplace of the Department of Biology is equipped with the information security described in point 8a.

Provision of library services at the place of study programme implementation

The PU University Library is a scientific-information, bibliographic, coordination and advisory workplace of the University, which provides library and information services primarily to students and employees of the University and, within its capabilities, to another professional public. UK PU develops its activities on the historical basis of the development of education and library culture of the region and continues the traditions established by the Collegiate Library and the Eparchial Library. The mission of the library is primarily to provide free access to information; to assist in meeting the cultural, informational, scientific research and educational needs and interests of the university; to promote lifelong learning and the spiritual development of the university. To this end, the library provides the following basic and special library and information services: lending services, bibliographic and information services, consultancy services, reprographic services and other services (processing of records of the publication activities of the university staff; bibliographic registration of final and qualifying theses; operation of the Digital Library of the CU PU; organization of exhibitions of scientific literature, exhibitions of works of art, concerts, presentations, professional library events, etc.). The library fund contains almost 225 000 library units (the annual increase of the library fund is about 4 000 books and 250 titles of periodicals, while the purchase of documents is carried out based on faculties' requirements with the aim of uniform purchase for the needs of all study programmes at PU). Since 2004, the library has been building a Digital Library (a database of electronic full-text publications created by the university staff, which contains over 800 publications. Since 1997, it has been building a database of PU publications, in which it registers over 66 000 documents. The library provides almost 280 000 loans annually, most of which are electronic. The total area of the library is over 2 600 m², of which 1 150 m² is for users. There are 303 study places in 6

study rooms (2 of which are database rooms). Over 70 000 readers visit the library every year and over 500 000 readers visit the library website. The library has its own computer network (PULIBnet) with 4 servers, 84 computers, of which 45 computers are reserved for users. Annually it publishes a bibliography of PU's publishing activity. The library provides access to 9 paid full-text database centres (EBSCO, Gale, ProQuest, Science Direct, Scopus, Springer, Taylor and Francis, Web of Knowledge, Wiley). - c) Characteristics and extent of distance education applied in the study programme with the assignment to courses. Access, manuals of e-learning portals. Procedures for the transition from contact teaching to distance learning.

In case of critical conditions for full-time education, we plan to implement a partial transition to distance education. Thanks to the MS OFFICE 365 package, which is used by the entire University of Prešov in Prešov, it is possible to share large files, online teaching and testing in a reliable mode. The following implementation of distance learning has proved to be the most successful from the Covid study period so far - interactive form of lectures using MS Teams and feedback using MS Forms didactic tests, respectively emphasis on oral online examinations and final evaluation of the courses. Courses with practical content such as Forensic Anthropology, Physical Anthropology, Genomic and Diagnostic Techniques are implemented in full-time attendance in accordance with and in compliance with current epidemiological measures (e.g., Covid automat, Rector's measure on epidemic situation and organization of the school year). The doctoral students' own research activities are also carried out in compliance with the current epidemiological measures. Part of distance learning in the Anthropology study programme is the provision of study materials (presentations, lectures, videos, tests) to students by direct upload to the MS Teams platform.

- d) Institution partners in providing educational activities for the study programme and the characteristics of their participation.

Invited lectures on specific issues and excursions of students to the premises of the departments are organised. Selected departments provide seminars, training on laboratory diagnostic techniques, workshops.

Students have the opportunity to undergo exchange stays, monthly or semester internships within the Erasmus+ programme at foreign institutions with which the Faculty of Humanities and Natural Sciences has signed inter-institutional agreements:

- e) Characteristics of the possibilities for social, sports, cultural, spiritual, and social activities.

PU students are accommodated in four separate facilities (ŠD - 17. Novembra street n.11; ŠD - 17. Novembra street n.13; ŠD - Nám. Mládeže street n. 2; ŠD - Exnárova street n. 36) and 2 specialized workplaces (Orthodox Priest Seminary; Greek Catholic Priest Seminary). The student house creates conditions for independent study and rest of the accommodated students, for the development of cultural, social and sports life and for the development of interest activities of the accommodated students. Accommodation of PU students is arranged in double - quadruple rooms with complete sanitary facilities in a cellular system. In 2018, the reconstruction of the ŠD 17 Novembra 11 and 13 was started, which was completed at the end of 2019. In all facilities, internet access is introduced directly in the rooms. There is a TV room, laundry, and tea kitchens on each floor. The University Pastoral Centre is available to students on the 11th floor. A hairdressing salon, a beauty salon and a health centre offer their services on campus. Coffee and sweet vending machines are available.

University students have the opportunity for leisure-time sports activities in PU sports facilities such as a swimming pool, gym, multi-purpose sports complex, or multifunctional playground. In both semesters of the calendar year 2019, the Faculty of Sports organised the PU University Mix Volleyball League and PU Football Mini-League for the students of the University, which are in constant demand. The University Sports Days organized by the Faculty of Sports also have a long tradition, with almost 600 students actively participating in 2019. University students can also develop their sporting interests in several sports clubs and

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clubs of TJ Slávia PU Prešov. Its membership base consists of around 300 athletes every year. Every year, the Faculty of Sports also organises a number of periodic and non-periodic sports and sports-educational activities not only for students, but also for the general public of different ages (Spring Run; Children's Sports Olympics of kindergartens; Olympic Pentathlon for seniors; Olympic Day Run; Sportsman's Run; ProSenior movement programme and others). In the implementation of these activities, the Faculty of Sports cooperates with students, the Olympic Club Prešov and the City of Prešov.

There are 11 artistic ensembles at the University of Prešov, which are members of the Council for Artistic Activities of the University. They operate at individual faculties of the university, whose professional guarantors are artistic directors. The members of the ensembles are mainly students of the University. The University's artistic ensembles are an example of the use of free time of university students, representing the University at domestic and international artistic events such as: academic competitions, shows, festivals, TV and radio performances, recordings, they significantly influence the cultural and social life of the university by independent performances and performances at university-wide and faculty ceremonial events, they represent and create the image of the university within the city of Prešov, the Prešov region, nationally and internationally.

The University Pastoral Centre of Dr. Štefan Hesek in Prešov (hereinafter UPC) <http://upc.unipo.sk/> is part of the nationwide network of university pastoral centres. Its main task is to care for the spiritual needs of university students and teachers. For its activities at PU, UPC uses the chapel in the ŠD on 17. Novembra street the TV room in ŠD Exnárová street 36 and the premises of aula 100 at FHNS. The Greek Catholic Youth Pastoral Centre (GMPC) www.gmpc.grkatpo.sk, whose founder is the Archbishop's Office in Prešov, is also active at PU in the spiritual field. GMPC cooperates very intensively with the GTF PU and offers various leisure activities. The role of this centre is to offer mostly young people working and studying in the city of Prešov a space to meet together, to engage in dialogue, to live their faith more fully as well as to live their mutuality with each other and with the world. This is done based on friendship, conversations, talks, invited lectures, spiritual and leisure activities.

The Rector's measure "Procedure for the implementation of outgoing student mobility within the Erasmus+ programme" is issued at the University of Prešov (PU) based on the provisions of Section 15(1)(l) of Act No. 131/2002 Coll. on Higher Education and on Amendments and Supplements to Certain Acts, as amended. For seconded students, credits are assessed based on their acquisition, i.e., the degree of compliance of the completed teaching with the given study programme is evaluated by the guarantor of the study. If the student wishes, he/she may also enrol in courses at the home institution and take them by distance learning if the nature of the course allows it. 9. Required abilities and admission requirements for the study programme applicants

- a) Required abilities and necessary admission requirements.

The outline description of the study programme is used to process Annex 2 of the application for granting the accreditation of the study programme.

The long-term goal and strategic objective of the University is to prepare quality graduates in accredited study programmes. The prerequisite for achieving this goal is to admit students who meet demanding quality criteria. The University has developed a system of procedures for the admission of students elaborated in the PU Study Regulations in Articles 3 to 9 and in the Rector's Measure Admission Procedure. Specific conditions of the admission procedure, corresponding to the specifics and peculiarities of the study programmes, have been developed by each faculty.

The admission procedure begins with the delivery of the applicant's written application for studies to the faculty or the university which implements the relevant study programme. In addition to the written application, which is compulsory, the faculty shall also allow the delivery of the application in electronic form without a guaranteed electronic signature, using an information system which enables the applicant to verify its registration in the information system from the date of its submission until the end of the admission procedure. The dean may decide whether the admission procedure will include an entrance examination or whether applicants will be admitted without an entrance examination. In justified cases, the Dean of the Faculty may announce a second round of the admission procedure. In the case of a study programme conducted at a university, the Rector shall decide on matters in which the dean has a decision-making power. The course and timetable of the admission examination shall be determined by the Dean of the Faculty. The faculty shall determine the form and content of the entrance examination. The dean shall appoint the chairpersons of the examination boards and admissions boards. The entrance examination shall be held on the date fixed, but the faculty may also fix an alternative date. The dean shall decide on admission to study. The Dean's admissions committee, whose members are appointed by the Dean, is an advisory body to the Dean. The Rector decides on admission to a study programme at the University. The Rector shall be advised by an admissions committee whose members shall be appointed by the Rector. The decision on the outcome of the admission procedure must be made in writing within 30 days of verification that the conditions for admission have been met. The decision must contain a statement of the reasons for the decision and an indication of the possibility of applying for a review of the decision. An applicant who fails to prove fulfilment of the basic conditions for admission at the time of verification of fulfilment of the conditions for admission may be admitted conditionally, provided that he or she is obliged to prove fulfilment of the basic conditions for admission no later than the date set for enrolment.

b) Admission procedures.

The basic condition for admission to the PhD programme in Anthropology is a second cycle university degree. The Dean of the Faculty will announce the dissertation topics that may be applied for in the admission procedure at least two months before the last day for the submission of applications for doctoral studies. The admission examination shall be held before an admission examination board. The admission examination board shall consist of a chairperson and at least two members appointed by the dean on the proposal of the chairperson of the departmental committee. If the admission examination is for a candidate on a subject advertised by an external educational institution, a representative of the external educational institution, appointed by the director of the external educational institution, shall also be a member of the board. The applicant shall submit a curriculum vitae, certified copies of evidence of educational qualifications; a list of his/her published articles or a list of the results of other professional activities, or, where appropriate, testimonials on these works and activities; and a draft doctoral thesis with a summary in English. The Admissions Board shall evaluate the result of the admission examination in closed session. If several candidates have applied for a single subject, the committee shall determine their ranking according to the success rate of the entrance examination. In determining the ranking, the committee shall take into account the quality of the dissertation project and shall also take into account the extent and quality of the applicant's professional publishing or artistic activity and the results of his/her other professional or artistic activity (e.g. results in student scientific and professional thesis competitions or student art exhibitions, etc.).
